This American Red Cross program provides a strong foundation for future successful completion of the Red Cross Lifeguarding Course. Junior Guards will work out daily to improve their physical fitness both on land and in the water. They will learn about causes of and ways to prevent drowning and diving accidents, how to supervise others around water, how to recognize when someone is in trouble, and basic first aid, CPR, and AED. Our August 3 selection is The Heretic's Daughter by Kathleen Kent. She takes us back to the Salem, Massachusetts, witch trials of the 1690s. Sarah Carrier and her family arrive in Andover, a town near Salem, where they find a community gripped by superstition and fear. The Puritans come to believe that heretics in their midst are responsible for the increase in Indian attacks and the spread of the plague.

Based on the accusations of a few young girls, hysteria mounts and ends with more than 200 men, women, and children sent to jail on charges of witchcraft. Among these unfortunate ones is Sarah's mother.

For September 14 we return to the classics and read Sense and Sensibility, one of Jane Austin's early novels. The Dashwoods, widowed mother and three lively daughters, are evicted from the family home when the father dies and the son inherits the home and the estate. They retreat to a small cottage in Devonshire, and the novel deals with their new life and the perpetual search for husbands for the daughters.

## Volunteers Essential, Here and There <br> by Florence Beier

Volunteers abound in the Highlands. Witness our amazing 4th of July celebration! We work at Filoli, the elementary school, food banks, and numerous other places in San Mateo County. But no one volunteers at a more distant and unusual place than Steve Gehre, who is a docent at Alcatraz. A 42year resident of the Highlands, he found himself looking for a new challenge after retiring from teaching at Burlingame High School. Ex-neighbors Sheila and Mike Mcquade, whom he ran into at the Half Moon Bay Nursery, suggested he try Alcatraz.

It turns out that all you have to do is check out the website or call a ranger, go out for an interview, take three Saturdays of 8-hour trainings, and you are (or at least Steve was) ready to guide and give presentations to large groups. Steve has read and studied to prepare for
talks on three topics so far: the "Birdman," the 1962 escape, and "staying sane on the rock."

One of the most fascinating parts of Steve's Alcatraz job is how he gets to this island in the middle of San Francisco Bay. He leaves home at 7:10 a.m., throwing his bike in the back of his truck. He parks the truck at Burlingame High School (a privilege as a "teacher emeritus") and loads his bike onto the 7:35 CalTrain for the city. After the train arrives at 4th and King, Steve rides his bike 2.5 miles to Pier 33 to catch the 8:45 a.m. staff boat for Alcatraz. In the afternoon he does a reverse commute.

Alcatraz has about 5,500 visitors per day, which now must be handled by a ranger staff cut from eighteen to eight, so volunteers are essential. Steve, who took groups of students and parents to Europe seven times, admired the guides
there and enjoys honing his guiding skills now. He greets the tourists as they stream off the boat and leads the standard tours, but his favorite tours are for about a dozen visitors to the dungeon, hospital, or laundry. He also offered to do a special tour for Highlands folks (who don't have to go by bicycle).

Volunteers are key to what makes the Highlands such a great community. This is true not just on the 4th of July or "off the hill," because the HCA, HRD, and CERT all depend on us. If you don't know what these letters stand for, ask at the Rec or your Area Rep, or go to www.highlandscommunity.org or www.highlandsrec.com.
